## UN Global Compact 18 Listed Industry Business Practices




## Tourism Partnership To Focus On Indigenous Rights

#### **MEDIA RELEASE**

March 24, 2014. Bangkok, Thailand and Wellington, NZ.

- WINTA and PATA have agreed to collaborate in developing plans and programs to give practical expression, through tourism, to Indigenous rights. Guiding principles will be taken from the relevant portions of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- This agreement follows their common focus in fostering tourism developments
   consistent with the principles of the Larrakia Declaration that were
   promulgated on 30 March 2012 at the Pacific Asia Indigenous Tourism Conference 2012 in Darwin, Australia. The Larrakia Declaration has
   also been supported by the United Nations World Tourism Organisation.
- "The establishment and operation of WINTA in 2012 following many years of dialogue among Indigenous peoples already engaged with tourism, marks the coming of age of Indigenous tourism and its capacity to work alongside like-minded international tourism organisations," said Mr. Ben Sherman, WINTA Leadership Council. "The choice and decision-making of whether and how to engage with tourism must always lie with the affected Indigenous peoples and it is important that they be afforded the opportunity to participate on the basis of free, prior and informed consent as envisioned by the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples," said Mr. Sherman.
